Profile: Mr. George Rausi – Chief Executive Officer, Solomon Ports



COMMONWEALTH STREET AND HONIARA PORTS ROADS UPGRADED

Solomon Ports in February held a commissioning ceremony to mark the completion of the Commonwealth Street entrance upgrade, enhancing access to both the International and Domestic Ports of Honiara. The project focused on improving four main roads connecting to the port.

The refurbishment, which was completed within two months, was fully self-funded by Solomon Ports and executed by China Railway Construction Engineering Group. The works included the re-sealing of Commonwealth Street, extending through the International Port Terminal, Yacht Club Mbokona Bay Road, and the entire Domestic Terminal area.

The event was attended by Chief Guest, the Minister of Infrastructure and Development,

Hon. Manasseh Maelanga, along with heads of diplomatic missions, Solomon Ports Board members, management, and staff.

In his remarks, Solomon Ports CEO Mr. Eranda Kotewalala emphasized that the project aimed to enhance the port precinct and uplift the city's overall appearance. He highlighted the significance of Commonwealth Street, describing it as one of Honiara's most appealing areas, home to iconic landmarks such as Unity Square.

Guest of Honour, Hon. Minister Maelanga, expressed his appreciation for Solomon Ports' commitment to infrastructure development. He acknowledged the port's initiative in improving the roads surrounding the Honiara Port, describing it as a valuable contribution to the government's efforts in enhancing urban infrastructure.

"This area, especially Commonwealth Street, is a popular gathering place in Honiara. It is very beautiful, and I believe this is the kind of development we want to see," said Hon. Maelanga.

"Solomon Ports continues to play a key role as a State-Owned Enterprise (SOE), supporting the government in infrastructure development."

The event concluded with a ribbon-cutting ceremony to officially mark the project's completion, followed by a guided tour showcasing the newly upgraded roads.





Second Overhead Gatehouse officially opened



Solomon Ports proudly opened our second overhead gatehouse today, officially inaugurating the new Exit Gatehouse at the Honiara Port International Terminal.

In a soft opening ceremony held on the 3rd of April attended by Management and Staff of Solomon Ports, the Exit Gatehouse was formally opened for use by port users and relevant stakeholders.

This new two-storey structure features three rooms on the upper floor. One of these rooms will house the new Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) Office, while the other two will be allocated to relevant stakeholders. The ground floor is designated for security officers, who will monitor vehicles exiting the terminal and verify documentation to ensure a secure and efficient process. The Exit Gatehouse follows the completion of the Entrance Overhead Gatehouse, which was opened in 2022. Solomon Ports is the only port in the Pacific to implement such overhead gatehouses at both entry and exit points of its international terminal—a testament to our commitment to innovation and operational excellence.

This new facility is a key component of our Port Modernization Plan and brings multiple benefits, including:

Reducing congestion and improving traffic flow, allowing two vehicles to be processed and exit simultaneously.
Enhancing security with better monitoring and automated processing.
Speeding up operations and reducing waiting times for importers, exporters, and transport operators.
Improving safety by optimizing the

movement of people and cargo within the port.

Speaking at the ceremony, Chief Executive Officer, Mr. George Rausi, emphasized that this achievement aligns with Solomon Ports' vision of becoming a world-class port that drives economic growth, trade facilitation, and national development.

"This reflects our commitment to aligning with international port standards, adopting modern technology, and continuously improving our services."

Mr. Rausi also extended his appreciation to all staff and contractors involved in making the project a success:

"I want to commend your hard work and dedication in bringing this structure to life. Your efforts are instrumental in the progress and success of Solomon Ports."

Solomon Ports Supports Livelihoods and Mangrove Conservation in Langalanga Lagoon

Solomon Ports in April made a special visit to Lalana Island in the Langalanga Lagoon, Malaita Province, to officially hand over tools and materials to members of the Koalimaurina Women in Business Association.

This initiative is part of Solomon Ports' ongoing Mangrove Restoration Project for Langalanga communities, in partnership with the Koalimaurina Women in Business and supported by the Gizo Women in Business. The project, which began in 2023, aims to promote the protection of mangroves and other coastal and marine ecosystems.

The recent handover marked the "livelihood component" of the project, designed to equip Koalimaurina members with the tools and knowledge to pursue alternative incomegenerating activities. These activities—such as vegetable farming, beekeeping, and savings clubs—are intended to reduce human pressures on the fragile mangrove ecosystems of the lagoon.

During the event, Solomon Ports provided materials and tools for the women to build their own beehive boxes, along with two boxes containing 15 varieties of vegetable seeds. These will help the community improve food security, boost nutrition, and generate income through the sale of surplus produce. In addition, two (2) 10,000 Liter water tanks were funded under the project to improve access to clean drinking water in Lalana and surrounding areas.

Speaking at the handover ceremony, Ms. Angela Sugeli, President of the Koalimaurina Women in Business Association, expressed heartfelt gratitude for Solomon Ports' continued support.

"The tools, seeds, and water tanks are a huge boost for us," Ms. Sugeli said. "They mark a significant step forward in improving our livelihoods and addressing the daily challenges faced by women in the lagoon." Village elder and community representative, Mr. Sudani Walemae, also acknowledged the support and highlighted the longstanding relationship between Langalanga communities and Solomon Ports. He reflected on the historical contributions of Langalanga men who worked as stevedores and laborers during the early expansions of Honiara Port.

Meanwhile, Solomon Ports CEO, Mr. George Rausi, said the Port was proud to support the people of Lalana.

"As a state-owned enterprise, we also have a responsibility to give back to our communities, especially in rural areas where people face many challenges," Mr. Rausi said. "We hope these tools and resources will benefit not just the Koalimaurina Association members, but the entire Lalana and Langalanga Lagoon communities."
